#### Potential packages of class exceptions & MIQ allocations in early 2021

Date:	11 December 2020	Priority:	High

#### **Purpose**

To seek your agreement to a package of proposed class exceptions for early 2021, including how these group arrivals could be sequenced through managed isolation, to minimise MIQ resourcing impacts and displacement effects for returning New Zealanders and other critical workers.

#### Recommended action

The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment recommends that you:

- a **Note** that this briefing provides advice on arrival dates for a number of proposals that the Ministerial Group considering border exceptions agreed in principle on 9 December, as follows:
  - Kāinga Ora build and urban development programme subject to start date
  - 1.000 international students
  - Superyachts (owners of America's Cup syndicates)
  - Summer of cricket subject to timing
  - Constellation Cup subject to timing

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#### **Managed Isolation and Quarantine Capacity Constraints**

e **Note** New Zealanders and critical workers continue to face lengthy delays for MIQ spaces, with wait times expected to stretch to three months by the end of December

  - b. Cricket: The cricket teams have a small degree of flexibility but require February entry
  - **c. Motor racing:** the dates of the motor racing series cannot be moved, and the group cannot be accommodated in MIQ within the timeframes requested

  - b. Option 2 Not recommended All 500 rooms are used for groups already approved (i.e. RSE workers) and by new class exception groups approved in principle by Ministers. No rooms are released back into MIAS for other travellers to book.

## **Background**

- 1. The Border Class Exceptions Ministerial Group met on 9 December to discuss a number of new class exceptions to border restrictions. Ministers agreed in principle to some of the proposals (the Kāinga Ora programme, international students, Americas Cup Superyacht owners, the "Summer of Cricket" proposal and the Netball Constellation Cup) subject to further advice being provided on how these group arrivals could be managed to minimise MIQ resourcing impacts and any displacement effect for returning New Zealanders.
- 2. Further advice on aspects of other proposals was also sought, including greater detail on group numbers and travel arrangements. A summary table of the discussion noting where Ministers sought further advice is appended as **Annex One**.
- 3. This paper provides the requested extra information to guide decisions on potential "packages" of exceptions.

## Decisions on proposals with lower impact and flexibility in travel

- 4. Senior Officials continue to recommend that Ministers confirm decisions taken in principle at the meeting on 9 December, subject to further advice provided, on the following:
  - a. Kāinga Ora build and urban development programme
  - b. 1,000 international students
  - c. Superyachts owners of competing America's cup yachts
- 5. The further advice sought is provided at **Annex Two**. Officials confirm that these groups have lower impact on MIQ capacity as they will be required to book places in MIAS as and when they become available, rather than requiring bespoke MIQ arrangements. Officials have not been able to check the impact of a delay in arrivals for the Kāinga Ora proposal at this time.
- 6. Officials also recommend that Ministers approve the addition of replacement international fishing crew to the government-approved programmes list as soon as possible due to legal and international relations considerations. These workers are not required to undergo MIQ. We understand that the Minister of Foreign Affairs is being provided advice on this over the weekend, and, subject to her approval, we recommend seeking agreement from the Ministerial Group through the circulation of this briefing as soon as possible.

## Current pressures on the MIQ system

7. Demand for places in our managed isolation facilities early next year exceeds supply, with travellers now unable to secure a managed isolation voucher (in most cases) until late February. On 1 December, the average wait time for a MIQ voucher was 2 months, 9 days. As of writing this had increased to 2 months, 15 days. By the end of December, it is anticipated travellers will need to wait three months before being able to secure a voucher.

8. Legal professional privilege

9. Demand for MIQ also continues to mount from critical workers that are eligible to enter under present border settings. MBIE has fielded a large number of emergency allocation requests

and complaints from employers concerned about timeframes for entry into New Zealand and the negative impacts of such delays for delivering projects which are reliant on overseas workers. Recent high profile requests have come in from the Tiwai smelter, Glenbrook Power Station, and the Visy glass factory, which all require workers for essential maintenance. If critical workers cannot enter New Zealand in a timely manner under current settings, this undermines the case for a further broadening of border exception categories.

#### High-needs groups place a considerable strain on the MIQ system

- 10. Our ability to accommodate groups is not just limited by available rooms, but also by our ability to plan for and provide the more resource-intensive services (e.g. increased testing, translators and additional welfare) that these groups often require. For example, in order to manage the Wallabies bespoke MIQ training arrangements safely this required additional resource for security measures, secure transport to and from the venue, additional health resource and additional cleaning.
- 11. High-needs groups (such as sports teams) with bespoke requirements, also tend to have greater MIQ system impacts than other types of travellers. This is because they typically require a whole facility or an entire wing of a facility to be ring-fenced for their exclusive use in order to be able to accommodate their needs safely. While a facility is emptied to prepare for a group's arrival, rooms in the facility cannot be used by other travellers. Once a group reaches the end of their stay in MIQ, there is a similar steep drop-off in room occupancy that cannot always be met by the number of incoming arrivals.
- 12. There are also operational limits when it comes to how many groups with bespoke needs MIQ can safely manage at any one time (e.g. it is not operationally feasible to host four sports teams contemporaneously in the one facility that require access to gyms) without unacceptably increasing the public health risk or strain on our MIQ workforce. Typically, per fortnight, the limit is two or three groups with bespoke requirements split between Christchurch and Auckland as these centres are better resourced to provide any wraparound support services.
- 13. Arrivals of groups also need to be staggered to ensure major activities are not concurrent e.g. arrival processing, day 3 testing, day 12 testing, and exit processing. These major activities require considerable resources to manage safely, which are compounded when groups are particularly large.
- 14. When MIQ is operating at, or near full capacity (as will be the case early next year), there is little 'fat' left in the system for MIQ Operations to be able to support groups that require complex or bespoke arrangements. Between January and March what spare capacity is available, will be diverted to supporting arriving groups of Recognised Seasonal Employer (RSE) workers, deep sea fishing crew and refugees. As RSE workers and refugees will be accommodated in Auckland that only leaves Christchurch as an option for hosting groups during this period. Other regions cannot accommodate bespoke arrangements due to staffing and resourcing constraints.
- 15. Accommodating all of the proposed new class exceptions at their preferred time would result in MIQ exceeding its safe operating capacity. We cannot use the rooms that are set aside for contingency purposes to cover this excess demand. The contingency is needed to ensure MBIE is able to respond in the event that an earthquake or fire takes one of our facilities offline. Nor do we have the option of being able to cancel MIQ vouchers already booked by travellers for this period.
- 16. This calls for strict prioritisation of group requests for MIQ space and resources. Ministers will need to make trade-offs between groups and decline some requests to ensure that the MIQ system can continue to operate within safe parameters and that those with an existing legal right to enter New Zealand can do so within a reasonable timeframe.

#### Principles to underpin allocation decisions

- 17. To enable ministers to make decisions on group arrivals in the short-term, officials temporarily set aside 500 managed isolation rooms per fortnight for group arrivals in early 2021. This was a precautionary number. We consider that this number is likely to be too high given the demands outlined above for MIQ space and will be providing further advice to Ministers on this early in the New Year.
- 18. While groups already approved for MIQ entry such as RSE workers will fill most of these 500 rooms set aside, there will be some rooms remaining that could be used to accommodate new class exception groups or other travellers (such as New Zealanders) seeking to enter over this period.
- 19. When making these allocation decisions, we suggest the following principles be used to inform decisions:
  - a. **Public health risks are kept manageable:** Decisions take into account the impost of MIQ on the public health system and protect the health, wellbeing and safety of New Zealanders.
  - b. Avoidance of unjustified limitations on New Zealanders legal right of entry:

    Decisions on the allocation of places take into account the legal right of New Zealand citizens and permanent residents to return without undue delay.
  - c. Fair and equitable: Decisions weigh up the full picture of demand for MIQ from a range of groups, including New Zealanders, critical workers (including health care workers), temporary work visa holders normally resident in New Zealand, and family members and dependents of New Zealanders. Any decisions to allow new class exceptions comes at the direct expense of other groups or individuals.
  - d. **Maximisation of MIQ capacity**: Given the cost of the MIQ system, MIQ resources are used efficiently to ensure MIQ continues to operate as a sustainable public health measure and advances the Government's economic and social policy objectives.
  - e. **Certainty**: Travellers can rely on confirmed MIAS bookings as a basis on which to organise their affairs.

#### Recommended approach

- 20. Officials continue to recommend that Ministers prioritise releasing capacity into the MIAS system over approving new class exceptions, to help ensure entry for high-value critical workers and to reduce delays for New Zealanders waiting to return home. However, if Ministers do wish to approve further class exceptions, we have developed the following advice on how these could be accommodated.
- 21. Ministers have two options for considering groups requiring bespoke arrangements over the January March 2021 period:
  - a. Option 1 Recommended Some rooms released back into MIAS; priority groups accommodated, and staggered entry of sports groups through until late March.
  - b. Option 2 Not recommended All 500 rooms are used for groups already approved (i.e. RSE workers) and by new class exception groups approved in principle by Ministers. No rooms are released back into MIAS for other travellers to book.

# Options if Ministers wish to approve further class exceptions for groups

- 22. Following the Ministerial Group meeting, officials have worked with lead agencies to determine if any of the proposals have flexibility in terms of their arrival dates and numbers. Sports New Zealand is trying to negotiate later travel dates for the cricket teams. Netball New Zealand has indicated that they have little flexibility to move on their preferred entry date of late January for the Australian Diamond Netball team, due players' domestic competition commitments.
- 23. MBIE Tourism will explore options for possible later travel dates for the Late Show with Stephen Colbert proposal. However, the commemorative events proposals have limited flexibility in terms of travel dates, given that the events are within fixed dates. Further information is provided at Annex Two. The table in the annex also captures the further advice sought by Ministers on the likely flow of international students, and how to manage demand for the commemorative events proposals.
- 24. In view of the above principles, and MIQ operating limits, we have developed the below package of options that Ministers may wish to consider. These options are based on the planning assumption that the sports teams will not be willing to come to New Zealand if they are not permitted to train while in managed isolation<sup>1</sup> and that the teams will show a degree of flexibility when it comes to their exact entry dates (not all sports teams will be able to be accommodated on their preferred dates).
- 25. Motorsport NZ has indicated that they have no flexibility to move on the dates for the Toyota Racing series and they have now opted to cancel the international component of their event. This group is therefore not factored into the options below.
- 26. Our planning assumptions for RSE have assumed twin-share arrangements. This is based on the original premise that RSE workers would arrive from low risk countries. The participation of high risk countries in this scheme would change this planning assumption and would require additional rooms to be assigned to RSE workers.
  - a. Option 1 Recommended Some rooms released back into MIAS; priority groups accommodated, and staggered entry of sports groups through until late March.
    - Of the 500 rooms put aside for groups in 2021, some are released back into MIAS (about 100, where possible) from 25 January for New Zealanders and other travellers to book.
    - The entry of the sports teams would be sequenced between late January and late March (see suggested entry dates in Annex 3) to minimise the overall impact on the MIQ system and optimise availability of training facilities and resources required to support them. Under this option, sports teams would be able to train while in MIQ, but only one sports team at a time will be able to be hosted in Christchurch, with some slight overlap between teams. This would also require the Australian Diamonds Netball team to shift their entry to late March (no earlier than 23 March). During periods of overlap, sports teams would have to agree to a compromised training schedule (e.g. teams train on alternate days).

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<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> There is a third option which we have not canvassed in any detail in this paper, which is to agree to allow the entry of the sports teams on a "rooms only" basis on the dates they want to enter (i.e. no training permitted).

- Visitors for the Commemorative events will be able to enter during the indicated timeframes in Annex 2 (e.g. early to mid-February).
- Under this option, the Colbert production crew could also be accommodated in Christchurch if their arrival date is no earlier than 11 March.
- Cargo crew servicing the Pacific could come in under this scenario, as well as
  workers for the Kāinga Ora build and urban development programme, but only if
  they are directed to secure their places in MIAS as and when places become
  available, as per other critical workers and travellers wanting to enter early next
  year.
- b. Option 2 Not recommended All 500 rooms are used for groups already approved (i.e. RSE workers) and by new class exception groups approved in principle by Ministers. No rooms are released back into MIAS for other travellers to book. Sports teams would be accommodated as per above (and on the dates noted in Annex 3). Under this scenario since we have some spare room capacity, we could accommodate additional non-complex groups wanting to come in early 2021 (i.e. reserve specific places for them), such as the cargo crew servicing the Pacific that require entry dates between January and February, and the Kāinga Ora build and urban development programme that would like to have some workers enter in January.
- 27. Option 1 above is preferred on the basis that it helps to balance competing demands on MIQ at this time, and that other travellers currently unable to secure a place in MIAS such as New Zealanders wanting to return home and critical health care workers will also have an equal opportunity to book some of the rooms that have been provisionally set aside for early next year.

## Upcoming advice on managing group demands for MIQ

28. Officials will provide you advice next week on a proposed ministerial decision making process for managing group demands on MIQ capacity and bespoke arrangements. Where groups require a class exception in order to get a visa, the Border Exceptions Ministerial Group considers the request and makes the decision to reserve space (as in this paper). However, not all groups placing demands on MIQ require a class exception (e.g. New Zealand sports teams or the US Antarctica programme) and at present the appropriate process for considering these requests is unclear.

## **Next steps**

- 29. If you agree to the proposed 'package' of exceptions, officials will prepare a paper for Cabinet Business Committee on Wednesday 16 December to confirm these decisions and those taken in principle by the Ministerial Group.
- 30. Officials will also prepare communications material and immigration instructions for the Minister of Immigration to sign to implement any agreed exceptions, noting compressed timeframes before Christmas mean that implementation may be operationally difficult before the New Year for non-urgent proposals.

  - 2.1 Cargo crew servicing the Pacific further advice sought on timing
  - 2.2 Replacement international fishing crew further advice sought on risks in declining
  - 2.3 Superyachts owners of yachts being refitted/refurbished (deferred)
  - 2.4 Superyachts other visiting cruising yachts (deferred)
  - 2.5 Visitors for commemoration events:
    - 2.5.1 Christchurch earthquakes –further advice sought on numbers
    - 2.5.2 Christchurch mosque attacks further advice sought on numbers
    - 2.5.3 Whaakari White Island deferred to later in 2021


