Building Consent Authority Structural Reform

Portfolio Building and Construction

On 11 September 2024, the Cabinet Economic Policy Committee (ECO):

- noted that New Zealand's current fragmented building consent system is leading to inconsistency, uncertainty and inefficiency, which makes it harder to build;
- **noted** that the Minister for Building and Construction (the Minister) considers structural reform is justified to address these longstanding issues;
- **agreed** that the Minister investigate options to reform the building consent system, including:
 - 3.1 consolidation of New Zealand's 67 Building Consent Authorities, as outlined in the paper under ECO-24-SUB-0192;
 - 3.2 exempting additional categories of building activity from requiring Building Consent Authority involvement and the liability associated with such activity;
 - 3.3 providing for private insurance to play a greater role in allocating risk of unsatisfactory building outcomes, including as an alternative to the building consent system;
- 4 **agreed** that the Minister commence targeted engagement on how to deliver consistency, certainty and efficiency in the building consenting system through structural reform;
- 5 **noted** that proposed building system reforms will affect the way in which liability for building defects is apportioned and it will be appropriate to consider questions of liability as a related area of possible reform;
- 6 **invited** the Minister to report back to ECO in early 2025 to seek agreement to consult publicly on detailed policy proposals for building consent authority structural reform;
- noted that transitioning to a new structure for the building consent system will involve at least some disruption and costs, and that further advice will be provided as part of the above report back.
